Learning about Laos

The Rev. Cn. Michael Ambler came to the church in January to talk about Restoration Laos, an organization he founded that is devoted to funding bomb-clearing teams in Laos. He told us about a secondary, secret war that happened during the Vietnam War. The attacks by the U.S. left over 80 million undetonated bombs littering the landscape. Baby Blessings Is Still Growing!

The need for emergency assistance for families and parents continues. St. George's provides free diapers and wipes—and occasionally other items—to anyone in need, regardless of income. Pickup takes place every fourth Saturday of the month, from 10 a.m. to noon, in the church office (the white house next to the main building). Recently, over 70 people came by to pick up baby items.

In December, the Diocese awarded us a \$600 New Initiative Fund Grant, which will help us purchase much-needed supplies and reduce the burden on those who have already given so much.

To try and meet the demand, church members Linda Samia and Maria Lantagne organized a diaper and wipe drive in January. We will continue to look for ways to get the community involved in this very popular offering so that it may continue to help others. If you want to help brainstorm, we're all ears!

This year's JUMBLE Sale featured a mix of indoor and outdoor items for browsing. As in past years, we encouraged visitors to pay what they thought was a fair price for items, which was a hit! More Community Meals

This winter, the church voted to let *It Takes a Village 207* and its partner *Sweetser* use the parking lot to serve a weekly meal. Quickly this relationship has evolved into something truly powerful. With it being cold out, the group now has a meal indoors where the unhoused and others can warm up while gathering together. That meal happens every Wednesday from 2 to 3 p.m. in the Parish Hall. And now, with the help of York County Shelter Programs, there will be to-go meals each Tuesday and Thursday from 2 to 3 p.m. People in need can drop by St. George's parking lot to get some good food then. Presents for Caring Unlimited

St. George's partnered with our neighbor, *Caring Unlimited*, to support a family displaced due to domestic violence during the Christmas season. The family, which had just arrived in November, consisted of a mother and her three children. The organization provided a list of requested gifts, including toys and clothing for each family member. In just two weeks, our community came together to collect over 25 items, plus wrapping paper, offering this family a sense of care and warmth during a difficult time. We hope it provided them with relief and happiness this holiday.
